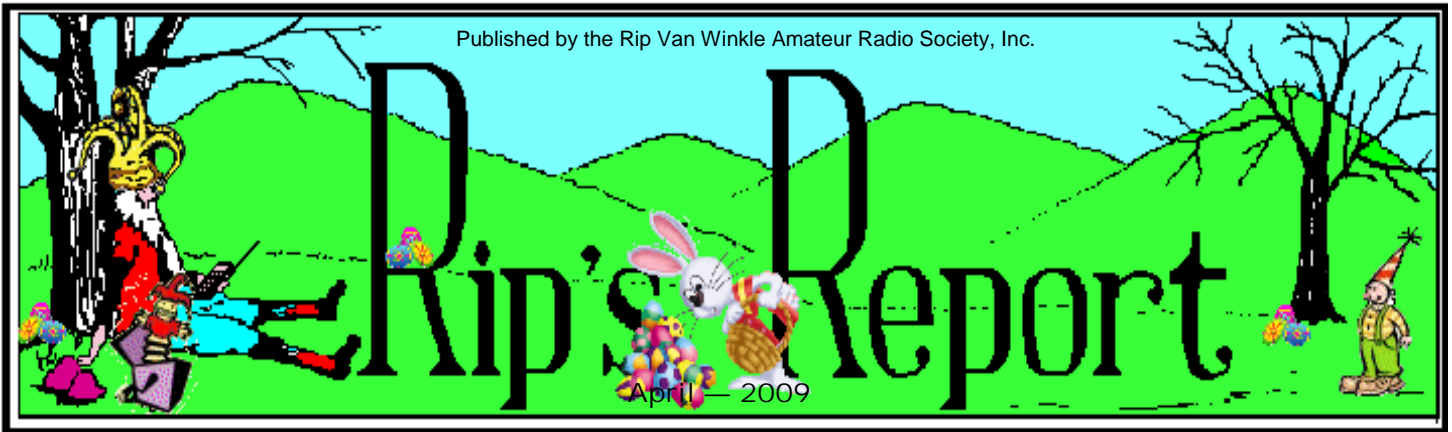

During the month of March, Steve, W2SXX, installed a 440 repeater near Ellenville, NY on the Shawangunk Ridge to compliment the N2LEN repeater system.

This repeater is part of an ongoing project headed by Len, N2LEN, and Steve. Len has always looked to improve and have a system for all hams to utilize and enjoy. Now having a system that has good coverage from Clifton Park area south to the Harriman toll plaza near Rockland county, even covering a long void of the northern Catskills, and into eastern PA and northern NJ, this system can compliment other repeaters and/or used as a backup during special events/emergencies and for travelers alike.

Work is still in progress for rectifying the 2 meter machine in Hudson, which should be finalized very shortly. Feed line issues have been a issue over the past 6 months, but should be fully operational in the next few weeks.

FCC to Deregulate Amateur Radio by 2008

In a bold move the Federal Communications Commission has decided to deregulate the Amateur Radio Service. This comes at a time when budget cuts within the Commission are forcing its Enforcement Bureau to shut down by 1 January 2005.

A spokesperson for the Commission stated that since Amateur Radio operators are supposed to be self-policing that this new move "should not pose a problem". And that it would also "solve the whole issue of restructuring".

This news has come as quite a shock to many in the Amateur Radio community, striking up many heated debates. "Basically we're being told that we're on our own as of 1 January, 2008", said a high-level League staff member.

In the interim between 2004 and 2008 Amateur Radio operators are expected to act just as they do now. "Nothing's changed yet, and all the rules and regulations are still in effect," said a spokesperson for the Commission.

All of this is set to change however, starting in 2008. On 1 January 2008 Amateur Radio in the United States will cease to exist as an official radio service. At that time it will be up to the operators to make up their own rules and regulations and to enforce them.

To clarify one other issue, "call signs that have not already been issued will all be available on the 'honor system'," said another Commission spokesperson. The bandplans and power limitations are expected to stay the same.

APRIL FOOLS FOLKS

April Fool!

In the April 1960 issue of QST, a phony full-page ad announced the formation of "Larsen E. Enterprises, Inc," supposedly off Route 128 in "Kippering-on-the-Charles," Massachusetts, with Larsen E. Rapp as president. Bearing a "Not an Advertisement" disclaimer, the ad offered customers free access to the company's air-conditioned "Wonder Workshop" with each kit purchase.

"If you don't have the time to assemble the entire kit yourself, one of our engineers will be glad to do it for you, just for the pleasure it gives him," the ad promised. "No tipping please."

In the "Print Shoppe," customers could purchase "authentic reproductions of the rarest QSL cards in the world." The price included having the company's "patient penman" fill in the card with your call sign and a signal report, duplicating the original ink and handwriting.

While the author's identity was not widely known outside of the ARRL Headquarters family, Byron Goodman, W1DX (SK) wrote a series of QST April Fool parodies under the pseudonym Larson (sometimes "Larsen") E. Rapp, WI0U.

QST editors recalled that after the bogus ad ran, they got a call from a member who said he was unable to locate the store and wanted directions. The Larson E. Rapp articles appeared between 1941 and 1962, although a "Larson" letter turned up in a

1972 QST "Correspondence" column. The editors said they'd sometimes get irate calls from amateurs after a Larson E. Rapp article appeared. "They didn't like to be fooled," they said.

The "ad" below is a take-off on the 1960 version. Would you fall for it?
